The Council of Management (as directors for company law purposes and as trustees for charity law purposes) present their annual report (being their directors' report) together with the audited accounts for the year ended 31 December 2009

RESULTS

Incoming resources for the year amounted to £539,676 (2008 £482,944) including amounts contributed by various bodies co-operating in and benefiting from the Trust's educational activities of £462,796 (2008 £411,315), other grants and contributions of £12,000 (2008 £1,500), and investment income of £64,880 (2008 £70,129) Resources expended amounted to £504,651 (2008 £500,128) giving rise to net incoming/(outgoing) resources of £35,055 (2008 outgoing £17,184) The net increase in the Trust's funds in the year, after realised and unrealised gains on investments and exchange differences, was £304,552 (2008 decrease £312,400)

The balance on the consolidated trust capital account at 31 December 2009 was £1,528,990 (2008 £1,528,990) of which £1,271,761 (2008 £1,271,761) was attributable to general trust funds and £257,229 (2008 £257,229) to the Abraham Rutenberg Trust Fund The value of listed investments held at the end of the year was £1,477,298 (2008 £1,187,962) in excess of cost, as represented by the revaluation reserve Of this revaluation, £194,518 (2008 £174,916) related to the Abraham Rutenberg Trust Fund and the balance to general trust funds The balance on the income and expenditure account was £280,192 (2008 £210,794)

Total consolidated trust capital and reserves at 31 December 2009 were £3,286,480 (2008 £2,981,928) The Council of Management considers that the Trust has adequate available funds, on a fund by fund basis, to meet its foreseeable requirements

FORMAT OF ACCOUNTS

Whilst recognising the accounts format requirements of the Companies Act 2006, the Council of Management consider that certain formats and terminology contained therein do not wholly suit a charitable (not for profit) organisation. In addition, the Statement of Recommended Practice ("SORP") Accounting and Reporting by Charities, SORP 2005, requires certain accounting treatment, formats and disclosures to be adopted in the annual report and accounts. The Council of Management therefore prepares the annual report and accounts of the Trust in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, as augmented by the requirements of the SORP

OBJECTIVES

The main object of PRET is to provide at its Institute in Haifa, Israel, informal education for young people by providing a framework which is not part of the State's official school system but complementary to it. The Institute assists and supports subjects where official or formal education is lacking. Over the years, the Institute's activities have developed greatly and now cover a wide range of educational projects all of which are guided by the object of fulfilling the objects of the charity

MAIN ACTIVITIES IN 2009

1 General

The Pinhas Rutenberg Educational Trust ("PRET") was founded in 1945 as a consequence of Mr Pinhas Rutenberg's Will in which he dedicated all his property and wealth to the purpose of educating the youth of Israel

This report summarises the PRET educational activity for the year 2009

2 Main Activities - 2009

2 1 Educational Activities and Seminars for Jewish Youth. The Institute continued organising and managing Zionist educational seminars for groups of Jewish youth. More than 500 students from the USA, Australia and Europe participated in seminars and youth/student exchange programmes. The average seminar duration was 4 days. New seminars were designed and presented to Jewish youth organisations in which utilisation of the communication technology infrastructure which is available in the Institute is used. We hope to enlarge the number of Jewish youth who participate in the seminars in 2010.

- 2.2 Communal Leadership of Ethiopian Youth This initiative, which was started in 2006 in collaboration with the Haifa Municipality, aims to promote communal leadership of youngsters from the Ethiopian community in Haifa. The Institute broadened the scope of the programme and the participating youth were offered paid apprentices' jobs as "Young Instructors" in the Institute's Educational Media & Communication Centre. The success of this programme resulted in schools requesting the Institute to run a formal programme (including matriculation exams) which will start in 2010. Overall, some 30 youngsters took part in the programme.
- 2.3 Educational Media & Communication Centre The centre, which is fully equipped to enable training of youth in communication media capabilities, serviced more than 1,850 youngsters from the Haifa area schools Following the continuation of the upgrade of the broadcasting studio, the Institute, in cooperation with the Ministry of Education in the Haifa area, started broadcasting programmes on the internet and TV channels for teachers and youngsters. This programme is planned to be an integral part of the Ministry of Education internet site.

3 Secondary Activities – 2009

- 3 1 General Educational Seminars The Institute provided facilities for educational seminars for visiting groups from Germany Overall, more than 250 participated in the seminars. The average seminar duration was 3 days
- 3 2 Educational Centres: The Institute provided facilities for the educational activities of "Young Entrepreneurs"
- Renovation and Modernisation of Facilities During 2009, the Institute continued to invest in the renovation and modernization of the dormitories on its campus A renovation of an old class building (built during WWII on the Institute's campus) has been started. This building will be named after the late Miss Ethel Wix
- 3 4 <u>Cooperation with the Boston-Haifa Partnership</u> The Institute provided rooms and facilities for the offices of the Boston-Haifa Partnership Since the Boston-Haifa Partnership is involved in activities and Seminars for Jewish Youth it is hoped that the cooperation will strengthen the Institute's ability to operate in this area

4 Summary

The Institute has been able to start new initiatives and to continue the ongoing activities of 2008. All activities during 2009 were constantly measured by strict accounting standards. The maintenance and further development of the educational activities have continued throughout 2009 without exceeding budget limits.

Reserves Policy

The Charity makes available all its income to the Pinhas Rutenberg Institute in Haifa. The Council of Management examines cash flow throughout the year and is satisfied that the Charity is in a position to meet any commitment it may make out of income and that its reserves are sufficient for its purpose. The capital is expendable endowment

Investment Policy

The Council of Management has the power to invest in such assets as they see fit. The Council takes advice from Deutsche Bank. Their policy is to generate both income and capital. They have maintained a high percentage of gilts which have provided a stabilising factor.

The Council of Management confirm that all investments held have been acquired in accordance with the powers available to the Council of Management

Risk Review

The Council of Management has assessed the major risks to which the Charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the Charity It is satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate their exposure to the major risks

RESPONSIBILITIES OF COUNCIL MEMBERS AS DIRECTORS OF THE COMPANY

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the report of the Council of Management and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

Company and charity law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the Trustees have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). Under company law the Trustees must not approve the financial statements unless it is satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and its subsidiary and of income and expenditure of the charitable company and its subsidiary for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the Trustees are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements,
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006 and the Charities Act 1993. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

FIXED ASSETS

Details of the movements in tangible fixed assets are shown in note 9 to the accounts. The Council is of the opinion that the values of the freehold properties (which are all held for direct charitable use) are above cost, but does not consider any benefit would be served by performing a revaluation

ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE

The charity is managed in the UK by the Council of Management comprising seven members, the work of the Institute in Israel which the charity funds are run on a day to day basis by Mr David Rutenberg, a Council member

COUNCIL OF MANAGEMENT

The current members of the Council of Management (as directors and members for company law purposes and trustees for charity law purposes) are listed on page 1. During the year, Mr John Rosenheim, Mr Isaac Meshoulam and Mrs Janet Bloch members of the Council of Management retired by rotation in accordance with article 45 of the Articles of Association and were re-elected unanimously. Mr Abraham Rutenberg was appointed a member of the Council of Management on 16 February 2010

NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED ACCOUNTS YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2009

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

- a) The accounts are prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of certain fixed assets, and in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, the Charities Act 1993, recommendations in SORP 2005 (Accounting and Reporting by Charities) and with applicable accounting standards
- b) The consolidated accounts incorporate the financial statements of the Pinhas Rutenberg Educational Trust and its subsidiary undertaking, the Pinhas Rutenberg Trust Limited The parent company has taken advantage of the exemption afforded by Section 408 of Companies Act 2006 not to present its own income and expenditure account. There were no differences between the results of the parent company and the results on a consolidated basis. Other than in the case of fixed assets, there were no differences between the state of affairs of the parent company and those on a consolidated basis.
- c) (1) Freehold and leasehold properties and fixed assets in Israel are translated at the rate of exchange ruling at the date of purchase Other overseas assets and liabilities are converted at the rates of exchange ruling at the year end
 - (11) Income and expenditure in Israel are converted at the average rate of exchange prevailing during the year
 - (iii) Gains and losses on exchange arising on transactions during the year are written off to income and expenditure Exchange differences arising on the above mentioned translation of overseas assets and liabilities are taken directly to reserves
- d) Income and expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis, except in the case of income from investments which is recognised when received Direct charitable expenditure represents expenditure on the Institute for youth education and other educational activities Indirect expenditure represents the cost of management administration and governance
- e) Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less provision for depreciation

Depreciation of fixed assets is provided by the straight line method so as to write off the cost of fixed assets over their estimated useful lives as follows

Freehold properties	25 years
Computer equipment	3 years
Furniture and equipment	10 years
Leasehold improvements	10-25 years

Long leasehold property is not depreciated

- f) Listed investments are shown at market values at the year end. A revaluation (non-distributable) reserve is maintained to reflect any excess of market values over costs. Any diminution in the market value of investments in excess of the balance on the revaluation reserve is provided for in the income and expenditure account where it is considered a permanent diminution in value.
- g) The Abraham Rutenberg Trust ("ART") Fund is a restricted fund which is subject to certain donor declared restrictions. The objects of the ART fund are the same as the objects of the Trust. Income from the ART fund may be applied by the trustees in furtherance of the activities of the Trust.
- h) The Israeli Electricity Company fund is a restricted fund which is subject to donor declared restrictions. The object of the fund is to assist towards the reconstruction of the Pinhas Rutenberg perpetuation room.
- The Arison Fund is a restricted fund which is subject to donor declared restrictions. The object of the fund is to assist towards the building of a computer centre aimed at giving training in communication and information technology.
