STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Board of Trustees

Trustees have been selected on the basis of extensive experience and knowledge of the charitable, finance and education sectors, with specialist skills in business, law and fundraising Significantly, two Trustees are under 25, lending direct experience of championship student debating to the company's core programme

The Board meets quarterly, with more regular contact between the Chairman and CEO Trustees serve tenure of three years with the Chairman's discretion to extend

The CEO reports to the Trustees, who are responsible for

- Establishing clear strategic direction and cultural identity of the company
- Monitoring the performance of the company and establish appropriate operating policies
- Financial
- Ensuring legal and regulatory compliance
- Acting as guardians of the company's assets
- · Maintaining the highest possible standards of governance

Organisational management

The company is managed on a day-to-day basis by the Chief Executive Officer, Margaret McCabe Margaret has over twenty years experience as a commercial barrister combined with two decades in the voluntary sector including Centre Point (homeless under 25s), NSPCC Justice for Children programme and as an advisor Human Rights Watch Margaret is a recipient of an UnLtd Award, recognising her contribution as a social entrepreneur with the launch of Urban Unltd Limited and the Debate Mate programme

Risk management

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those relating to the specific operational areas of the charity and its finances. The Trustees believe that by monitoring reserve levels, ensuring controls exist over key financial systems and by examining the operational and business risks faced by the charity, they have established systems to mitigate those risks

OBJECTIVES AND AIMS

The company's core objectives as set out in the Company's Memorandum and Articles of Association are to increase life skills, academic attainment, progression to higher education and self-esteem in young people in state schools in Britain through debating (Debate Mate) and the creation of youth volunteering opportunities. Debate Mate is a social enterprise, which delivers life skills and opportunities in areas of high child poverty. A social enterprise puts profit back into the charity to fund its programmes. Via involvement in Debating, Debate Mate aims to provide invaluable experience for the under 25's wishing to gain careers in our main growth industries, namely, music, fashion, media, financial services, politics & good governance. Critically, the programme is offered to under 25's for free. The Debate Mate programme is run in collaboration with Teach First, an independent charity founded to encourage top graduates, who would not normally enter teaching, to teach for at least two years in challenging inner-city schools.

All of the company's activities are aimed at achieving these core objectives and many are complimentary, helping to achieve more than one

The charity's aims for June 2009 - June 2010, were to:

- Expand programme in London
- Pilot programme in Birmingham and Manchester
- Continue to develop model of peer-to-peer mentoring
- Pilot Entrepreneur and Employability Programme
- Pilot programme in Nepal
- Continue work in UAE
- Investigate expansion to US
- Develop a social enterprise business plan
- Continue to evaluate impact of programmes

The Debate Mate Programme ran in 60 schools in London, 9 schools in the Midlands and 5 in Manchester from Sept 2009 – June 2010

Debate Mate recruited 3 full time Programme Directors and approximately 120 mentors to deliver the programme

The core programme, targeted at 12 - 15 year olds, consisted of

- A launch event at the Royal Institute, attended by Michael Gove, Secretary of State for Education
- Regional launch events in Birmingham and Manchester
- 16 weeks of after-school debating clubs Approximately 1000 young people took part in Debate Mate clubs each week
- The Debate Mate Urban Debate League (in partnership with The Joseph Rowntree Foundation), 3 rounds of local debating competitions followed by a final at Deloittes Approximately 450 young people took part in each round and 50 in the final.
- The concluding competition, the Richard Koch Cup, a series of one day debating competitions at the London School of Economics, Birmingham and Manchester Universities, and a grand final at the House of Lords attended by Stephen Fry, Krishan Guru Murthy and Alan Parker, Chair of Brunswick PR The competition was sponsored by founding funder Richard Koch Approximately 600 young people took part
- Training of teachers whose schools took part in the Debate Mate programme
- Online resources to support teachers and students via the Debate Mate interactive website

Debate Mate also ran

- 2 training days at the Shell Centre and 1 at the Legatum institute, involving over 120 young people
- A pilot of the Entrepreneur and Employability Programme, working with 16 18 year olds using debating to develop entrepreneurial skills, and skills relevant to the world of work Approximately 80 young people completed the programme
- A project with Petchey Academy in Hackney, working with the entire Year 8 cohort (12 13 year olds) using debating as a tool to deliver core curriculum subjects (Science and History)

In addition, Debate Mate

- Selected and trained the UAE Schools team throughout the year, assisted by world champion debaters. The team of five students competed at the World Championships and won the inaugural best newcomer award.
- Partnered with the Bamboo Schools in the poorest areas of Nepal to run a debate training programme ran by several Debate Mate mentors during the summer of 2010 800 young people participated in the programme held over 6 weeks
- Investigated and developed a model for expansion of the programme into the US

Monitoring and evaluation of the programme:

The clubs are monitored on an ongoing basis, with regular mentor evaluations. The Programme Directors and CEO attend the clubs and receive weekly feedback from the teachers in school (online and by phone). This information is collated by the Programme Directors and used to refine techniques and professional development of mentors.

Debate Mate followed a model originally developed in partnership with the New Economic Foundation to comprehensively evaluate the impact of the programme

- Improvement in academic performance (mental discipline) and achievement
- · Greater academic involvement/engagement among participants
- An increased curiosity to learn
- Higher self-esteem, pride and sense of achievement
- Greater respect of others and their lives
- More young people being empowered
- More confidence to try new things

Amongst other findings

- 89% of participants stated that their ability to spot a bad argument had increased or increased greatly
- 86% of participants stated that their ability to to use formal English fluently and with confidence had increased or increased greatly
- 86% of participants had stated that their ability to prepare for a discussion had increased or increased greatly
- 61% of participants had stated that their ability to work on their own had increased or increased greatly
- 83% of participants had stated that their ability to combine different arguments/ideas/examples had increased or increased greatly

- Successfully delivered core programme, Debate Mate
- Successfully expanded outside of London
- Created positive outcomes for young people
- Successfully piloted debating in the curriculum at Petchey Academy
- Developed its work overseas (UAE, Nepal, US)

- Develop an accreditation programme for participants volunteering their time to run their own debate club and mentor other young people in their school

 - Government DCSF, DIUS, DCLG, DWP, Ministry of Justice

Equal Opportunities, Access and Cultural Diversity

Debate Mate strives to be an equal opportunities employer and encourages contributions from all sectors of the community. The company is committed to student-led and peer-to-peer learning. In the areas where Debate Mate operates, there are 200 different cultures, our target groups are by their very nature culturally diverse. The programme works in concert with schools to support the curriculum through debating. Debating is a compulsory part of the curriculum at Key Stage 3 and 4 'speaking and listening' Debate Mate is the only organisation teaching it. Debate Mate explores subjects of community and global interest through the clubs, promoting skills to combat conflict resolution, encourage good citizenship, and develop verbal intelligence in young people traditionally excluded from opportunities for career development.

The Trustees are very grateful to all our volunteers and donors, some of whom have pledged three-year support for the children, young people and adults we serve

Public Benefit

The charity's main activities and who we provide them for are described above. All our charitable activities this year focused on delivering the Debate Mate training programme to young people in areas of high child poverty in inner city schools and were undertaken to further the charitable purposes for the public benefit

Approximately 1000 young people took part in Debate Mate programmes per week during the period of the core programme (October 2009 – April 2010) 120 Debate Mate mentors, young people themselves, benefited from direct training in leadership and programme delivery. However, the benefit is much wider than this, each club is sustainable within each school, and the skills imparted to pupils and teachers is utilised across the school and curriculum, to many more young people. The programme is provided for free

The evaluation framework developed by the New Economic Foundation was followed, and Debate Mate identified qualitative and quantitative outcomes of benefit to those involved, acknowledging the long-term benefits (and achievements of Debate Mate), working towards empowering young people to achieve entrance to further education and the workplace Debate Mate is developing Onward Learning projects and work placements with partner in the UK's key growth industries, noted above

We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aim and objectives and in planning our future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves Policy

As explained, the charity carries out a diverse range of activities. The Trustees have examined the requirement for reserves i.e. those funds not designated for specific purposes or otherwise committed. The trustees consider that, given the nature of the charity's work, the level of reserves should be maintained at not less than three months operating costs in reserve. The trustees are of the opinion that this provides sufficient flexibility to cover temporary shortfalls in income flows and adequate working capital to cover costs.

The charity had £43,548 in bank current accounts at the end of the year

1. Accounting policies

a) Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of certain fixed assets, and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP 2005) applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006

The company has taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No.1 from the requirement to produce a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is a small company.

b) Incoming Resources

Grants and donations

Grants and donations are only included in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has unconditional entitlement to the resources, it is certain that the resources will be received and the monetary value of incoming resources can be measured with sufficient reliability

Tax reclaims on donations and gifts

Incoming resources from tax reclaims are included in the Statement of Financial Activities at the same time as the gift to which they relate

Volunteer help

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report

c) Taxation

Debate Mate Limited is a registered charity which renders its income exempt from UK income tax

d) Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as resources expended where there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and includes, where applicable, value added tax which is irrecoverable.

e) Costs of charitable activities

Costs of charitable activities are the costs applied by the charity in undertaking its work and achieving its charitable objectives, as opposed to the cost of raising funds to finance these objectives. Charitable activities are all the resources expended by the charity in the delivery of the educative services, including its programme that is directed at the achievement of the charitable aims and objectives. Such costs include direct costs of the charitable activities

f) Governance costs

Governance costs are the costs associated with the governance arrangements of the charity that relate to the general running of the charity, as opposed to those costs associated with fundraising or charitable activity. Included within this category are costs associated with the strategic planning for its future development, the training of the Trustees, external review and any legal advice

h) Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are those that are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes

Restricted funds are funds that are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or that have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements
