The Trustees present their report and the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2011

# **LEGAL STATUS & ORGANISATION**

Sunfield Children's Homes Limited is registered with the Department for Children, Schools and Families under sections 347(1) and (3) of the 1996 Education Act as an independent residential school suitable for pupils with severe learning difficulties. It is registered as a Children's Home under the Care Standards Act 2000, and is governed by the regulations of this Act

It is a registered charity and is constituted as a company, limited by shares. Its objectives, powers and other constitutional matters are set out in its Memorandum and Articles of Association

## **OBJECTIVES & ACTIVITIES**

In setting our objectives and planning our activities the Trustees have given careful consideration to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit

The objectives of the charity are focussed on children with severe and complex learning needs,

- > to help, support and educate young people with severe and complex learning needs
- > to provide support, assistance, education and training to the families and carers of people with severe and complex learning needs of any age
- > to advance the education of the public and promote greater understanding
- to conduct research into the causes, prevention, alleviation and management of severe and complex learning difficulties

Based at its residential school in Clent, Sunfield's students originate from all over the country. Students are referred to Sunfield by experts in the field of Learning Disabilities and funding for their costs at Sunfield is provided by the individual student's local authority. Sunfield welcomes and caters for students from all backgrounds and faiths. We are an equal opportunity organisation and we are committed to creating a working environment that is free from any form of discrimination.

The charity is active regionally, nationally and increasingly internationally in its provision of Outreach, Training and Research services and facilities. Sunfield's strategic aims and operational plans reflect the aspiration to make the organisation's expertise more widely available to our targeted beneficiary groups.

# STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE & MANAGEMENT

The Trustees of the Charity are also Directors of the Company The whole of the issued share capital of 100 £1 ordinary shares is held in trust by all the trustees equally

The overall policy and direction of the charity is the responsibility of the Trustees who meet regularly throughout the year. Trustees are appointed in accordance with the Memorandum and Articles. The main Trustee body is supported by a number of sub-committees. At least two Trustees with appropriate skills and expertise sit on each committee and direct the development of the charity within their delegated authority and / or make recommendations to the main Trustee body for consideration. All trustees upon election are provided with the necessary training and support in order for them to fulfill their duties.

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

Following involvement with Sunfield for many years, including the last ten years as a Trustee, Roger Pauli retired as Chair at the AGM in September 2010. The Trustees recorded their warm thanks to Roger for his contributions to Sunfield over the years and in his term of office as Chair, particularly in respect of the commissioning, building and completion of the new school building. Guy Brocklebank was elected as the new Chair.

Since September 2010 strategic planning and the day-to-day management of the charity has been delegated to the Principal, Amanda Jones, supported by a Senior Leadership Team

An Advisory Council with representatives from the Education, Business and Health sectors, plus the local community, parents and siblings, meets regularly to advise and assist the Trustees and executive staff in the fulfillment of their responsibilities

The Senior Leadership Team maintain a Risk Register which sets out the major risks, the impact of such risks and the systems and procedures which are established to mitigate such risks. Significant issues identified are raised with the Trustees immediately, and the Trustees formally review the whole Register annually.

# POLICIES ADOPTED

Educational policy is governed by the requirements of the National Curriculum and the Education Act 1996 Care policy is governed by a range of statutory instruments and standards. All of this is monitored by Ofsted

The majority of Sunfield's income is generated by charging placing authorities fees for the cost of providing education and care for children. The charity utilises its charitable status to raise funds for new developments and capital projects.

Sunfield employs salaried staff with the appropriate qualifications to provide education and care for pupils and does not rely on volunteers

Sunfield is fully committed to its Equal Opportunities Policy. It aims to ensure there is no discrimination on the grounds of disability and that access to work and promotion is based on ability, qualification and suitability for the work.

Sunfield holds Investors in People status and is committed to developing its staff to achieve its aims and objectives. There are regular meetings between managers and staff to promote effective communication

Trustees review the potential fluctuations in income compared to the high level of fixed costs as part of the annual budgeting process. The Trustees are seeking to increase the charity's Free Reserves (the unrestricted reserves that are not represented by the charity's fixed assets, currently totalling £3 8m) to £6m to equate to gross expenditure cover for six months. This figure is regarded as a target that may take several years to attain through investment growth, legacies and other general donations alone.

In addition Trustees have an Investment Policy, reviewed annually to ensure effective management of funds. The objective of the policy is to seek to maximise total return within our chosen investment criteria by a combination of income and capital growth.

Land and buildings at Clent have not been valued, there being no current reason to do so and the cost of any valuation exercise being significant

# REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

### REVIEW OF THE YEAR 2010 / 11

In September 2010, Sunfield's new Principal, Amanda Jones, and our new Head of Education, Caroline Bell, both took up post, marking a new stage in Sunfield's development

Sunfield continues to deliver high quality services and we are delighted to report that, following an unannounced two day Ofsted inspection in May 2011 (under the revised National Minimum Standards for Children's Homes), the team of inspectors graded Sunfield's services as 'Outstanding'

The very positive Ofsted report reflects not only the outstanding practice, but also the high levels of parental and local authority satisfaction that have been achieved in regards to the outcomes for the children who are placed here, and our strategic plans and vision for the future development of our services. Key to the outstanding grade was our strengths in Training, Health Care and Family Support Services.

Sunfield is continuing its programme of development and, in addition to the new educational facilities that were completed in 2009, there have been some notable additions to the facilities and resources in 2010 Sunfield recognised the growing need for sensory resources and the impact that good sensory integration programmes can have on the development of the child. In response to this Sunfield planned the extension and development of resources to include a new sensory integration therapy room, an outdoor sensory play area, a Snoezelen/sensory room and a sensory garden. These outstanding resources and staffing provide detailed sensory integration plans which make Sunfield one of the leading service providers in the sector.

Throughout the year, our Education Department, in partnership with colleagues from Care and Occupational Therapy, has increased the emphasis on work-related learning and social enterprise, which enables students to develop their communication and numeracy skills in meaningful and highly motivating ways. Students with complex needs often struggle to generalise and apply learning across contexts, so we need to provide specific support to ensure that the progress they make in the classroom equips them for adult life Students are taking increasing responsibility for the care of animals on Sunfield's farm and using the walled kitchen garden to grow fruit, vegetables and flowers, their confidence and independence is growing and it is great to see them applying their communication, reading and numeracy skills outside of the classroom

2011 is the 'Year of Communication' and, given that communication is a significant barrier to learning for all of our students at Sunfield, this year we are focusing on increasing the opportunities that our students have for expressing choices and reflecting on their learning. Staff have benefited from opportunities to build on their knowledge of existing approaches e.g. Intensive Interaction and Picture Exchange Communication System (PECS), and to explore ways of harnessing new technologies, such as 1-pads, to enhance communication, enabling us to respond more creatively to the challenges that our students face in expressing their views

The staffing composition of the Psychology and Therapies Department has been extended this year to accommodate the growing complexities of our students. We now offer a comprehensive range of therapies and support services for our students including Occupational Therapy, Sensory Integration Therapy, Speech & Language Therapy, Music Therapy, Play Therapy and specialised Counselling and Psychology support

Key developments this year such as the addition of a new range of sensory facilities have helped us to develop our Sensory Integration work through our Occupational Therapy department

An advanced web-based system for recording and monitoring incidents has been jointly developed by an interdisciplinary team made up of a Teacher, Care Manager, Behaviour Development Coordinator and Assistant Psychologist. The system reduces the need for paper-based recording and allows and encourages proactive analysis of incidents and patterns of difficulties. This program has been tailored to the needs of Sunfield and, after a pilot study, will be used across site.

A joint research project has also been carried out by our Psychology and Speech & Language teams to explore the benefits of innovative Behaviour Management approaches

Over the last year, students have also continued to benefit from sessions of music therapy. Music is universal as it does not rely on language, this makes it particularly apt for young people with a learning difficulty. Students can share meaningful communication by improvising and vocalising with the therapist. At the same time, music therapy is also a means for processing feelings that may have no other positive outlet and it can promote levels of social and personal awareness that are generally inaccessible as a result of a learning difficulty or other disorder.

One of the key developments this year has been to explore how Counselling may aid our Students in their move to an adult placement. The build-up to the student's move is an anxious and challenging time for everybody concerned the young person, their family members, Sunfield staff, and the next placement staff. We are therefore developing a 'Moving On' programme for our students where counselling can make a positive contribution to the transition process to their new home as an adult

The children have also enjoyed a wide range of activities throughout the year during their leisure time including, for many, short holidays, day trips, and an ever expanding range of leisure and learning opportunities such as swimming, clubs, adventure/theme parks and the use of specialist sensory facilities. This is made possible through the use of a small fleet of vehicles, most of which have been funded through donations, and our 4x4 seven seat vehicle proved invaluable during the severe winter, when many local roads were snowbound.

A highlight for seven of our students this year was a week's adventure holiday at an outdoor pursuits centre supported by a multi-disciplinary group of staff. Activities included caving, rock climbing, abseiling, canoeing, zip wire and archery

Our work with families is also very important to us and the Family Centres continue to be valued and extensively used These self contained flats offer our families a secure place of privacy to spend time with their child. We also have a family visiting room which has proved to be very popular with families who are visiting for the day and who don't need overnight accommodation. Based on the success and demand for these family facilities, we are now also developing a suite of rooms that will offer more daytime accommodation to our many families. All facilities provide parents, siblings, grandparents and other family members with an appropriate, safe environment for them to spend quality time with their child whilst having the back up of staff support should they need it

We value the importance of the whole family and working with brothers and sisters is an extremely important part of our work. By involving siblings from the beginning, we are able make sure they still feel involved and an important part of their brother's/sister's life. During their association with Sunfield we help them develop an understanding of the overall needs of their sibling and how they can understand and support them as they progress together into adulthood. We also help siblings to have fun by offering activity days and weekends via our sibling support programme. The aim is to give siblings an opportunity to meet and interact with others in a similar situation to themselves and we have found that this has facilitated friendships where siblings keep in touch with each other beyond the boundaries of the group

Sunfield Assessment and Outreach Service is currently going through a further restructuring process, now being line managed by Education. This ensures that skills are kept to the highest level and that we staff according to need. SAOS continues to focus on providing support to other special and mainstream schools, featuring tailored packages for individual students and consultations for school staff. Last year SAOS successfully supported several students in making the transition from other schools into Sunfield.

In acknowledgment of the additional need for day places, which we do not have, and the complex needs of some students which cannot be met in other schools and which do not currently fit within our cohort, Sunfield is in the process of making available additional accommodation. This will accommodate up to four young people and may be used as an interim placement towards full time education and/or care at Sunfield.

Whilst we continue to admit a similar number of young people each year, we have two significant leaving groups this year and next which we have anticipated and planned for. This has required Sunfield to engage in a redundancy process to adjust staffing according to student numbers. Happily the required cuts have been entirely achieved by way of voluntary redundancy applications.

Sunfield continues to be committed to and looking for new ways to improve practice, ensuring that the child's needs are paramount. Accordingly new services and facilities are being constantly developed to meet the needs of children with a wider range of learning disabilities.

We are also taking the opportunity to undertake a planned programmed of refurbishment and alterations to the site and in particular to student residential accommodation, we have further plans for redeveloping and reconfiguring another residential house in 2011 in order to respond to the changing complexity of referrals and admissions and to improve our residential flexibility. This will ensure that we offer the best possible living environment for current children and future referrals, backed up by the 'Outstanding' services which were highlighted by the recent Ofsted inspection

Whilst Sunfield's overall financial position remained stable, the state of the public sector finances will undoubtedly remain a concern to us for some years to come (Sunfield is largely dependent on the fees to local authorities in respect of each individual child's placement) As an independent organisation, Sunfield does not receive government grants for developments, so we utilise our charitable status to fund projects of a capital or developmental nature such as building work, equipment, vehicles, etc, through fundraising, grants, donations and legacies

Despite the adverse global economic climate, Sunfield has continued to be successful in its fundraising thanks to the generosity of our many supporters. Following the successful appeal that enabled Sunfield to build new educational facilities in 2009, we have continued to improve our resources through donated income.

# REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

This year, the main focus of our fundraising has been on raising funds for the new range of sensory resources (as described earlier in this report). These appeals have been successful and the new resources now offer existing students and future referrals valuable resources to help them to develop to their full potential. Other items funded through charitable sources this year included another minibus, refurbishments to residential accommodation, and improvements to the outdoor learning opportunities on our farm.

It would be unfair to single out particular funders in this report, as every donation is valuable to us, so we would like to thank everyone who made a donation or grant, organised an event, or supported us in another way, your support enables Sunfield to continue to offer the children and their families the best possible range of services and facilities and to maintain its position as one of the UK's leading providers of services for children with severe and complex learning needs

## RESPONSIBILITIES OF TRUSTEES

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity at the end of the year and of the surplus or deficiency for the year then ended

In preparing those financial statements, the Trustees are required to select suitable accounting policies, as described in the notes to the financial statements, and then apply them on a consistent basis, making judgements and estimates that are prudent and reasonable. The Trustees must also prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended 31 March 2011

# 1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

# Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention (modified to include the revaluation of investments) and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005, applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006. The principal policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows.

# Going concern

For the foreseeable future the Trustees consider Sunfield Children's Homes Limited a Going Concern based on recurring funding received from the local authority to enable them to provide a level of care for its pupils and cover overheads. The Trustees also believe that reserves are maintained at an appropriate level to provide a sufficient level of cover necessary should it be required.

### Income

Income derived from fees is accounted for on an accruals basis. Income from donations, legacies, bequests and dividends is also included when receivable. All income is attributable to the one principal activity of the company which arose wholly within the United Kingdom.

# Resources expended

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis. Overheads are allocated over the charitable and fundraising activities in proportion to the direct costs borne by those activities.

### Investments

Investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date. The SOFA includes the net gains and losses arising on revaluation and disposal throughout the year

## Fixed assets

Items of a capital nature, capable of lasting more than one year and costing more than £5,000 are normally capitalised

# Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows

Motor vehicles	25% pa	- straight line
Freehold premises and new buildings	1% - 10% pa	- straight line
Plant	10% - 20% pa	- straight line
Furniture and equipment	10% - 25% pa	- straight line
Tractor and farm implements	10% - 25% pa	- straight line

A full year's depreciation is charged in the year of acquisition and no depreciation is charged in the year of disposal

# Operating lease agreements

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to income on a straight line basis over the period of the lease

# Consumables

It is not the company's policy to include consumables as a current asset in these financial statements. It is noted though that the consumable store area contains a constant supply of medical and domestic supplies for daily use not thought to be in excess of £15,000 at any one time

# Pension costs

Teachers are eligible for membership of the Teachers' Pension Scheme All other staff are eligible to join the stakeholder scheme with an employer's contribution of varying rates

Fund accounting

Unrestricted Funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees to fulfil the charity's general charitable objectives

Designated funds are unrestricted funds which have been earmarked by the Trustees to be set aside for a particular purpose

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or through the terms of an appeal

Gifts in kind

Gifts in kind are included in the accounts at an estimate of the value to the charity at the date of the gift

Recognition of liabilities

A liability exists where a present obligation of the entity arising from past events, the settlement of which is expected to result in an outflow from the entity of resources embodying economic benefits

Pension

Sunfield operates two money purchase pension schemes, contributions payable are charged to the SOFA in the year in which they are due
