REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

Introduction

The Trustees, who are also Directors of the charitable company, present their report for the year ended 31st March 2011 In presenting this report, the Trustees have complied with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (2005), the Companies Act 2006 and applicable United Kingdom Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards

Reference and Administrative Information

Bow Arts Trust ('Bow Arts') was founded by Marcel Baettig in 1995. The Trustees (listed on p. 1) delegate the day to day management of Bow Arts to Marcel Baettig as Chief Executive and senior staff members. The Board is responsible for setting strategies and policies with the Chief Executive.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE & MANAGEMENT

Organisational Structure

Bow Arts is registered with the Charity Commission and is also a company limited by guarantee Bow Arts is established under a Deed of Trust dated 6th June 1995 and Memorandum & Articles dated 6th March 1995, as amended by a Deed of Amendment dated 13th January 2006

During this accounting period (year ending 31st March 2011) the Directors were the sole members of the company. All members are granted one vote per company resolution including the election/re-election of Directors to the Board at the AGM. The Board devolves certain responsibilities to the Core Services Committee which meets quarterly, between four and six weeks before each board meeting.

Governance

The governing body of the company is the Board of Trustees, which has a maximum of ten members. The method of the recruitment and appointment of Trustees is through co-option during the year and then election at an AGM of the company by the members. New Trustees are recruited according to the skills needed for a balanced Board, by agreement with the existing members. All newly appointed Trustees must sign the Code of Conduct and Conflict of Interest Policy. The Trustees elect a Chair, Vice-Chair and Treasurer annually following the AGM.

The Trustees have considered the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit in relation to the objects of the charity. This report sets out those objectives and describes how they have been met in the current year.

OBJECTIVES & ACTIVITIES

Mission Statement

The purpose of Bow Arts is to provide a sustainable working environment for emerging and established artists, while promoting the value of art to the public through

- Contributing to Community Regeneration
- Artists' work in schools
- Gallery exhibitions and events

PROPERTY DEPARTMENT

Staffing: Changes to the department's staffing structure took place between July and September 2010. The two part-time Property Coordinator posts were made redundant and replaced with a full time post of Property Assistant, initially as a 6 month training post. Tilly Hogrebe was appointed to this role in October 2010, and was joined by Francis Ives just after the start of the new financial year.

Marketing: With the planned move to the new SE1 site, and recognition of Bow Arts main client group being 'emerging artists', two free Residency Studio Awards were made to recent graduates, in a marketing campaign rolled out to all the main London Art Colleges

In addition a new website 'Artist Studio Finder' was launched alongside the existing London's Artist Quarter website. This is a simple studio search site for artists and artist studio providers to use, and was promoted along with the Residency Award through art colleges and college career fairs.

Bow Road Studios, 181 - 183 Bow Road, E3 2SJ

Bow Arts' first and largest studio site provides studios, a public gallery showcase, and base of operations for Bow Arts education activities. The site is spread across **two buildings**, with a total of **30,430 gross sq ft** (24,600 sq ft net). There are currently **115 artists** benefitting from the affordable studio provision in the building. The **dedicated gallery space** provides 2,000 sq ft of space for showcasing quality art exhibitions and events

Occupancy: maintained at an average of just over 98% throughout the year

P1 Studios, Mocha Court, 15 Taylor Place, E3 2FX

This 5,000 gross sq ft (4,300 sq ft net) site which was internally refurbished the previous year provides 11 studios for 16 artists in the ground floor of a large new residential development. Our partnership with East Thames provides a minimum of £15,000 inward investment into community focused arts activity annually. This sustainable investment is in lieu of rent, over the 20-year lease on the building

Occupancy: Initially phased at the start of the year and stabilised into 98% occupancy over the last 5 months of 2010/11

SE1 Studios, Willow Walk, SE1 5SF

In a new partnership with Crisis, Bow Arts has created 50 studios for emerging artists, minutes from the thriving London Bridge Quarter. On this site, 20,000 gross sq ft (13,300 sq ft net) over 2 floors of a warehouse has provided studios for 85 artists. The focus on supporting emerging artists is seen through the awarding of 4 Residency Studios, provided at nil cost to the recipients.

An initial two-year lease in partnership with Crisis at very low rent is likely to be extended to June 2014

Occupancy: Initial phased occupancy from August 2010 has stabilised into 92% occupancy for the final 5 months of the year

Live/Work Flats in Poplar HARCA Estates, E3 and E14

The ongoing partnership has continued to create homes and studio spaces for artists in void properties that would have otherwise been decommissioned by Poplar HARCA. Changes in Poplar HARCA's internal development timetable have resulted in reduced growth in the number of flats taken on this year.

The scheme currently provides homes to over 100 artists, in 65 flats spread over 9 buildings in 6 estates. The 65 flats equates to approximately 50,000 square feet of property. The groundbreaking scheme has proved hugely popular, encouraging young professional artists to relocate and contribute to one of the most deprived wards in the UK.

Occupancy rates for this scheme are 100%.

Property Summary:

- Total affordable studio / workspace provided by Bow Arts 55,000 sq ft
- Total affordable residential (Live/Work) / studio space provided by Bow Arts 50,000 sq ft
- The 105,000 sq ft of space managed by Bow Arts creates income that is invested directly back into the arts each year In 2010/11 this represented around £257,000 of inward investment to the areas in which we work

EDUCATION & LEARNING DEPARTMENT

Staffing: Rob Smith came into post as Head of Education and Learning in August 2010 Education Assistant Rob Crosse left in September 2010 to take up full time studies, and was replaced in October 2010 with Becky Lees Anna Sexton's role has shifted away from Education Development and towards a more Community-focused programme of work, line managed by Chief Executive Marcel Baettig but operating within the systems of Education & Learning The team is now working well together with clearly defined roles, a strong sense of shared direction and are committed and hard working individuals

Education Clients

The number of education clients went up 22% from 2009/10, totalling 28 for the year 80% of clients are repeat bookings, with the remaining 20% being new clients A declining proportion of education income from Tower Hamlets clients continues (from 75% - 65%), while rises in both Southwark and Islington should be noted (from 6% to 11% and 20% respectively) Two thirds of schools income (66%) comes from primary school clients, with the remainder from secondary clients (34%) The highest spending clients were St Pauls Way Trust School at Secondary level (total income for year £20,080), and Hugh Myddelton at Primary level (total income for year £15,603)

The total average spend per client for the year sits at £4,296 (a vast 60% reduction on the previous year) This is reflective of significant changes within education within the last 18 months

A number of government funded programmes that schools have previously used to buy in the services of external providers (Creative Partnerships, Find Your Talent, Extended Services, Specialism Funding for the arts) have now ceased or are no longer ring-fenced for this type of activity

Opportunities for Participation

Bow Arts delivered 692 artist-led sessions over the year and created over 11,400 opportunities for children and young people to participate (comparative data from previous years is not available) 54% of activity took place within school time, with the remainder as after-school programmes (30%) and Professional Development opportunities for teachers, support staff and artists (16%)

Activity has included:

- Teacher INSET
- Large-scale collaborative projects (primary and secondary)
- Development of an in-school artist studio space and creative writing room, managed by the pupils
- Gallery visits
- Careers sessions
- Accredited programmes
- Ongoing delivery of an arts programme with a Pupil Referral Unit (for students excluded from mainstream schools)
- A variety of master classes, topic-based and cross-curricular projects and after school clubs

<u>Artists</u>

41 artists delivered work for Bow Arts across the year 34 new artists and 17 new volunteers were registered, widening the pool of artists available to deliver education activity

Education Finance

In addition to the income generated through schools projects, grant funding was secured from Find Your Talent, Futureversity, Tower Hamlets Arts and Music Education Service (THAMES)

Systems

Following a thorough internal audit, effective systems and processes are now in place for Project Planning, Artist Registration, Image Permission, Contracting, Financial Management, Child Protection and Evaluation & Monitoring

The department has a new 3-tier, banded pricing structure for artists (£180 per day, £140 per day, and volunteer) and has reduced the amount of additional paid planning and preparation time

Other Developments

There have been positive developments in the formation of relationships with consortium models in Manor Park, Newham and Poplar, Bow Early work has also begun on the development of educational packages, which will be rolled out to schools in 2011/12 Rob Smith has joined the governing body at Manorfield Primary School, Tower Hamlets

THE NUNNERY

The Nunnery has seen a full programme of activity this year, not only in the recognised exhibition space but also through a new series of high profile public art commissions delivered with local regeneration partners. This has built on last year's successful hoardings project with St. Paul's Way Foundation School. Chief Executive Marcel Baettig has led this programme and built solid relationships with British Waterways, Poplar HARCA and London Borough of Tower Hamlets, establishing Bow Arts as a commissioning agent for new public art in each case.

Other work delivered under the Arts & Events banner includes the Balfron Project Australian Artist Simon Terrill (International Artist in Residence, 123 Balfron Tower, March-Nov 2010) created a large scale photographic event at the iconic Balfron Tower, involving all the tower's residents and capturing images of this community in and around their homes. The resulting image was exhibited in the Nunnery in January 2011 This project was supported by Arts Council England through Grants for the Arts.

The gallery has developed a good regular audience for private views, and the partnership with Time Out's First Thursdays has brought significant marketing resource to this. The Nunnery's reputation as a venue for hire has also developed this year, with an increase in the number of space hire enquiries and leads, and a greater variety of events being hosted there. This is a new area of income generation for Bow Arts, and one that will be developed further over the coming months, specifically with a view to exploring the opportunities for this in 2012.

Jeremy Clarke, Assistant Director and Head of Arts & Events, made the decision to return to teaching in autumn 2010, and following his departure at Christmas, the first part of the 2011 gallery programme was administrated admirably by Gallery Assistant Alex Anthony (who began as an intern with Bow Arts) and overseen by the Senior Management Team Through the ongoing restructure of the department, and a refocusing of the gallery's position within the organisation, it is anticipated that a Gallery Director will be recruited in the autumn of 2011 to deliver the next phase of activity

ACHIEVEMENTS & PERFORMANCE

At the start of the year the Board approved a clear set of objectives for Bow Arts to deliver on, in line with existing strategic developmental targets. The appointment of Rob Smith as Head of Education & Learning was a significant step forward in the refocusing of this department. The impact of this has already been seen in the strength of the new partnerships being brokered, and supported by improvements to internal procedures, especially in the evaluation of projects.

On a pan-organisational level, the agenda for growth was given a significant boost in January 2011, when Bow Arts was announced as **one of Arts Council England's new National Portfolio Organisations**, with a three year funding agreement starting from April 2012 This funding, totalling just over £150,000, will act as a catalyst to support Bow Arts **realisation of its ambitions** in terms of growth into new sites and other boroughs, by supporting a part-time post in Education and the development of the London's Artist Quarter website

Bow Arts has completed internal assessments for the PQASSO Level 1 award, and is working towards Level 2, with the intention to apply for external assessment for the Level 2 kite mark at the end of the summer 2011 PQASSO is the leading quality assurance package for the Third Sector, and through completion of a rigorous self-assessment programme, Bow Arts has been working to bring all internal systems and processes, as well as all externally facing operations up to standard

The process has been exceptionally valuable to the organisation as a whole, bringing all areas of activity to an acceptable standard. This work has developed further, with a new business model and accompanying business plan being prepared. This will present clearly the ambitions of the organisation in the short and longer term, and identify how best to reach these aims

During this year Bow Arts has been a member of the National Federation of Artist Studio Providers (NFASP), and Bow Arts Chief Executive is an invited Director on the Federation's Board NFASP is the governance and support agency for the artist studio sector, and it is able to elicit independent, expert advice for its members, as well as monitor performance of the sector as a whole The Trustees are pleased that this connection continues, especially as Bow Arts develops more strategic ways of working

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Bow Arts achieved a surplus of £66,815 in 2009/10 and has continued this trend into 2010/11 in line with its commitment to secure a reserves base. A surplus of £66,488 was achieved this year, in line with expectations

The main income stream in the year continued to be licence fees and rents receivable from artists for the provision of studios and LiveWork spaces. The Trustees have adopted a policy of increasing studio licence fees annually in April, and LiveWork rents in October, based on the previous September's RPI.

Reserves Policy

Bow Arts policy is to aim to maintain three months' core expenditure as 'free' reserves at any point in time in order to provide a cushion against unanticipated reductions in income or increases in expenditure

At the year end the total reserves stood at £294,528, an increase of 29% on the previous year. Of this amount, free reserves were £241,027, approximately £91,000 in excess of the target figure of three months' anticipated core expenditure.

Designated reserves were £33,181, of which 100% will be spent during the coming year

Restricted funds were £20,320 This comprises London Thames Gateway Development Corporation funds to support an Education development post (final year £6,500), Payne Road Studios SLA funds brought forward for projects delivery in 2011/12 (£5,450), Project funding from Manorfield Primary School (£2,850), Project funding from THAMES (£5,520)

Risk Management

The Trustees confirm that they have identified and assessed the major risks to which the organisation is exposed, and have established systems of support to mitigate these risks

Measures put in place by the Trustees to strengthen systems and mitigate risk include

- Kinney Green act as Bow Arts surveyors and advise on rent reviews, lease renewal etc
- Stone King Solicitors act and advise on Charity Law and governance

- TF Consultancy were engaged to support the submission of the Arts Council England NPO funding bid, and continue to inform discussions with London Borough of Newham
- Andrew Broadley was engaged to direct the restructuring of Education & Learning, culminating in the appointment of a new Head of Department
- Trustee meetings are held at least quarterly
- Core Services Committee meetings are held at least quarterly
- Department sub-committees have been established to offer specific Trustee support to individual areas of strategic development

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2011

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Preparation of Accounts

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities issued in March 2005, applicable United Kingdom Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards and the Companies Act 2006

Incoming Resources

Incoming Resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable

Investment Income

Investment income represents interest received on monies held on deposit

Resources Expended

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered

Expenditure which is directly attributable to specific activities has been included in these cost categories Where costs are attributable to more than one activity, they have been apportioned across the cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of those resources

Governance costs are those costs associated with constitutional and statutory requirements, and the governance arrangements of the Charity They include audit, legal and other professional fees

Operating Leases

Rentals applicable to operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as incurred

Depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are depreciated to write off their cost less residual value over their estimated useful lives at the following rates per annum

Leasehold property improvements - over the length of the lease

Leasehold property

- over the length of the lease

Office and computer equipment

- 25% per annum

Live/Work improvements

- over three years

New Studios

- over the length of the lease, or period to first break clause

Live/work flats have been made available by Poplar HARCA, a local social landlord without fixed lease terms. It is anticipated that each unit will remain available for an average of 3 years and depreciation of improvements is therefore written off over this period

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Designated Funds

Designated Funds comprise amounts set aside representing the depreciated cost of assets funded by capital grants and rent increases foregone and for supporting community and education projects

Restricted Funds

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used

Taxation

As a registered charity the company is generally exempt from Corporation Tax but not from Value Added Tax (VAT) Irrecoverable VAT is included with the cost of those items to which it relates

Cash Flow

The financial statements do not include a cash flow statement because the Charity, as a small reporting entity, is exempt from the requirements to prepare such a statement under Financial Reporting Standard 1 'Cash Flow Statements'
